Each look at Jesus would strengthen us to endure and finish well. He waits for us on the other side. He is our crown, and we will be with him forever. Every huff, every twinge of pain, and every prolonged day on earth is worth patiently enduring the journey to get to the finish line – to get to Jesus.




Year 12 Psychology

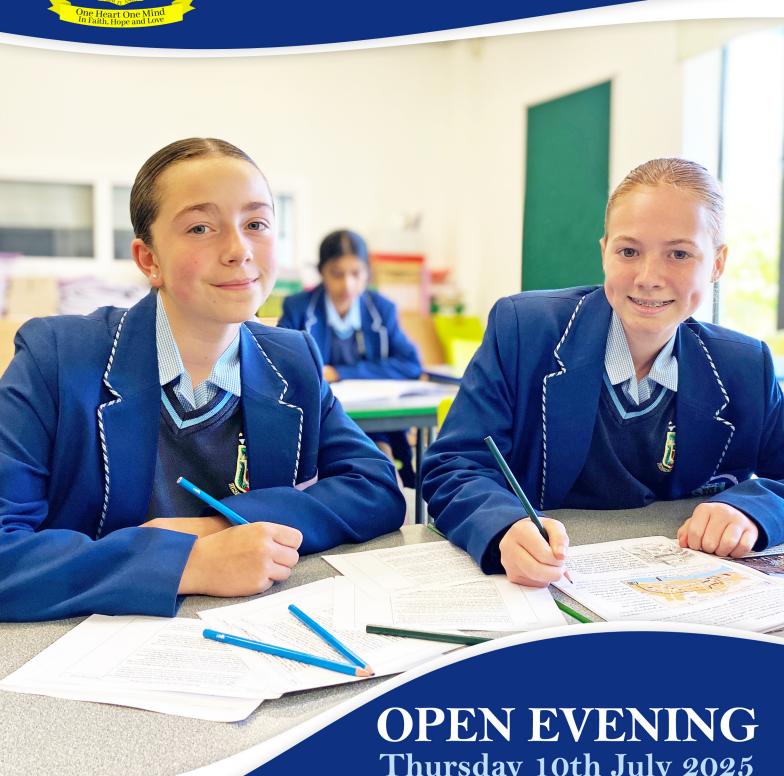

Silver Award 2025

Practice Expedition 19th-21st June: overcoming the heat.

Last Thursday (19th June) Year 10 pupils taking part in their Silver Duke of Edinburgh Award set off from school to begin their three day Practice Expedition in West Lancashire. The expeditions are much more challenging at Silver, compared to Bronze in terms of both distance and duration. The forecast heat wave only added to this already massive challenge the girls were facing.

We left just after 9 am to make our way to the start point in Melling by school minibus. Mr Parry (Site Service Manager) kindly took to pupils rucksacks in his own car so we didn't need to hire a second minibus. Once the rucksacks were on, maps, compasses and emergency phones had been issued, the groups headed off on their first day of walking – a planned 17 kilometres in the sunshine!



It was a very hot, uncomfortable day for all involved with groups having to pass through a number of staffed check points until they reached the campsite at Scarisbrick Hall. Pupils had been reminded to bring and reapply sun cream regularly as well as wear a hat and there was the opportunity to top up their water at each of the check points. The pupils showed great stamina and resilience on the first day of walking, carrying a full pack (as they are required to be self-sufficient) when the temperature was in the high twenties. The final group made it to the finish just after six and then had to set up their tents and cook their own evening meal. One of the requirements of the expedition is that 'participants must plan an appropriate expedition menu, including cooking and eating a substantial hot meal each day (optional on the final day)'.

The second day of walking was just as hot and as uncomfortable but staff adjusted the route to support the pupils and they all carried much lighter packs. At times morale was low, the heat and aches and pains were getting to some but they all continued and completed the second day of walking. Having battled through the tears for some, the groups were back at the campsite by late afternoon. Having rested, eaten and relaxed, a few hours after some had doubts about continuing, the same pupils were running around and playing on the swings and climbing frame at the girl guide campsite.



The planned route on day three was shorter and in terms of navigation, more straight- forward.

After already having walked over 30 kilometres and slept two (hot and humid) nights in a tent, many pupils found the final day a challenge they couldn't see themselves overcoming.

With the groups working well together, constant encouragement from staff and a massive amount of determination the pupils ploughed on through the heat and followed the planned route following the Leeds to Liverpool Canal.

All groups made it safely to the finish, blisters aside, by lunchtime of Saturday. Neil (Site Services) gave up some of his free time to meet us in Parbold and take the rucksacks back to school. The pupils now need to reflect on what they achieved, the issues and problems they overcame and consider what they could do even better on their final, assessed expedition in July.

Thank you to Mr Kennaugh and Miss Lawrence who gave up their time, working longer days (and half of their weekend) to help run this expedition. This part of the pupil's Duke of Edinburgh Award would not be able to go ahead without the support of many other 'behind the scenes' staff including Site Services, Office staff, Reprographics, Cover, Chaplin Phil and the Finance Department.
